ornaments will be donated by MWA members and donations will be on display starting at the November meeting. Proceeds of the auction will benefit the chapter and be used to support our mission of education.



# What's On My Lathe?



#### Mike Rohrer

I'm turning this square bowl, *ala* Steve McLoon, from a beautiful block of mesquite I got from Jim Jacobs at the SE Metro meeting. I had never turned mesquite before; what beautiful, dense, wonderful-to-turn wood.

I sanded the entire outside of the block to 320 (although it was very smooth and beautiful at 60) before I mounted it using a screw to mount for turning the bottom and a mortise for turning the top.

For turning the top, I am using both a standard bowl gouge and a Hunter straight tool and turn with the lathe running in reverse, which I find much more comfortable for turning the inside of bowls.



# Spike's Keg of Nails and 'Nowledge

Both golf and turning involve hundreds of small nuances-ways of holding the club, selecting the right club, body position-that make the difference between a hole in one and a muffed shot. And in the same way Tiger Woods makes swinging a seven-iron look easy, Alan Lacer makes wielding the skew chisel look effortless and second nature.

As we head out the door and the end of the day of turning class, Lacer gives each of us a transfer-type tattoo on a small piece of paper. It's a tattoo of a wood-turning chisel. It's the kind that will wash off in a day or two, but it's easy to see how turning could stay with you for life.

The concept of sandpaper as been with us for a long time. In the thirteenth century, the Chinese began using natural gum to glue sand and crushed shells to parchment paper to create an early form of sandpaper. The first true sandpapers, actually made of sand and paper, were being sold in Paris as early as 1769.

Most sandpapers today contain no sand, and very few belt sander belts even contain paper. The "sand" is most often flint, garnet, aluminum oxide, and silicon carbide. The "paper" is usually a woven material like rayon, polyester, film, or cotton.

Most owners of hand-held belt sanders have inadvertently raced theirs at least once by plugging in the machine with the trigger lock accidentally set in the ON position – then watching it propel itself off the workbench or across the raised cabinet door they've been painstakingly working on!

# Tips for Turners

## Mike Rohrer

I had this Jet air filter for over 20 years and it worked well in my furniture making shop (large part of the basement). When I moved into my 12' x 12' turning shop, I moved it in, mounted it on the ceiling and it worked for just a short time. It would run for just a little while and then quit. It didn't seem to be overheating. Then it stopped running totally. I spent lots of time on the phone with the Jet folks and lots of money, including a new "board". It would start, run for 30 seconds to a minute, then quit.





I gave up and then remembered that I had seen a couple of woodturners using a box floor fan with a furnace filter taped on. I bought the fan for \$25 at Lowes and a pack of 3 filters for several dollars and mounted it. It seems to be working as well as the Jet did. Lee Tourtelotte says he has been using filters like this for 20 years and likes them.

I need some help. I've only turned a few pieces of fresh wood. I love it! It turns so easily, I love the large chips that come off the tools, the beautiful curves I seem to be able to get easier than with the very dry blanks. The problems I'm having:


- 1) when I don't have time to turn the bowl to completion in one day (which is what happens virtually every time), I come back to the bowl the next day and there are cracks in the end grain
- 2) when turning the inside of the bowl, the tenon that I make the same size as I do with dry wood cracks or breaks off.
