If the ornament globe sales were successful at the October meeting, more Rosand style globes may be available


During November, members should turn finials and add them to their Ornament Globes. Bring them to the December meeting or submit pictures for the December Participation Challenge.



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
What's On My Lathe? (cont'd)

This is a piece of silver maple, which Lee Tourtelotte gave me. It was from his neighbor's tree which was being removed. I started turning it the next day. This is the freshest piece of wood I have ever turned. I had never experienced what I had heard turners talk about, getting sprayed with water while turning and having such large chips come off with the bowl gouge with such ease. Jay Schulz told me to immediately treat the ways and the underside of the banjo, which would rust and seize up almost immediately. This picture was taken after I had sealed the surface with 50% lacquer and sanded with 80 grit.







Spike's Keg of Nails and 'Nowledge

When workers recently built the seventy-eight-story Central Plaza office tower in Hong Kong, they used what to most Westerners would seem to be a strange material for scaffolding: grass. It's a grass that doesn't really act, look, or feel like a grass. The grass they used was bamboo-over a hundred thousand poles of it. This was no isolated incident; 90 percent of the scaffold used in Hong Kong is bamboo. And no wonder-according to contractors and builders it costs 95% less than steel scaffolding and goes up six times as fast.

Alan Lacer's skill level and tool arsenal are a quantum leap beyond mine. I'm attending a daylong class at Alan's studio (for whatever reason carvers and wood turners have "studios", while cabinetmakers and furniture makers have "shops"). Fully half the day is spent sharpening. "Turning should be effortless," Lacer explains. "The tool should do the work." And though instinct might say a sharp tool is dangerous, it's the dull ones that catch an edge or are forced that cause the most injuries.

"Lathes are incredibly safe," explains Lacer. "It's the only stationary power tool where you hold on to the cutter and you push the sharpened end away from you. I've worked with kids as young three and a half years old on the lathe."

One of the beauties of turning is its broad appeal. Turners include amateurs who like instant gratification, professionals who are raging perfectionists, and every mindset in between.







A few months ago, he mentioned that we should do a turning demonstration at "Field Day at the Farm" near St. Cloud. When his wife, Anna's, grandfather died 10 years ago her mom became the first female in 100 years to run this very large farm. Now it will move to the 5th generation for management which happens less than 1% of the time as farms are usually sold off by the 5th generation. To start to make the place more inviting, make it into a creative space, and revive people's feelings toward the farm, Anna's mom and sister came up with "Field Day" 5 years ago. Eighty-five people attended this year; in years past there have been as many as 170. The day is filled with lectures, demonstrations, swaps, hands-on activities. It's a chance to connect people with one another and to the place.




