





Ask A Turner

From Newsletter #47, Jane Hilary

I would really like to know how to make a bowl/dish that has rings of other woods in it, like the one that Ken Hallberg made for the challenge. I'm not interested in the plywood part but just the process. Other turners have made them too and it would be fun to try one. I really have not had much chance to turn lately so I need something to get my interest sparked again.

Ken Hallberg's Answer

Jane - Thanks for your question and interest in the Trifecta Bowl. I consider it an interesting challenge.

The easiest way to be exposed to the process is to view an excellent 10 1/2 minute YouTube video entitled "The Trifecta Bowl." A good way to view it is to Google "now this is going to be interesting."

While the video shows a 7" plywood cube, any combination of wood types can be used.

Ask A Turner (cont'd)

The first one I turned was a 7" plywood cube and my second was a 5" cube of plywood with accent pieces of birch, walnut and bubinga. Any size cube is possible. Just be sure the cube is very accurate. Also, since much flat surface gluing is required, it is important that the surfaces be very flat. A drum sander or similar will be helpful.

In the video, use is made of CA and lithium grease on the cube corner that fits into the tailstock. A good alternative is to use a revolving center in the tailstock with the cone and center pin removed.

Be careful. Good luck and good turning. Let me know if there are further questions

When a tree falls in the forest, when does it become a bowl?

While the question is an attempt at humor, it is also my real question. I am very new to turning and have listened to and read lots of information but still don't have a grasp on what is "wet wood" and what is "dry" in terms of turning and when a turning is done. Is there an objective measure like using a moisture meter?

Here are some examples of information I have come across:

One inch per year air drying. What if you don't know the log's age?

Microwave to dry quickly. When would you do this besides having a project that will fit in a microwave?

What is starting and ending moisture? How long to mic it?

Turn it wet and then put in bag with shavings until it dries. What is considered wet?

How long or what measure until "dry"? Is it the same for all species of wood?

I am looking for some practical guidance short of gaining 20 years experience and just knowing.



Lidded puahala #2 - walnut, oak, cherry, mahogany, & colored Baltic birch. 3 1/2" D X 4 1/2" H

Cherry 6" diameter burl on a 17" branch, turned as one integral piece, except for the supporting base, which is black ash burl. The cherry burl is hollowed to accept either a glass candle holder, a house plant, or maybe nuts and candy. The burl was given to me by a neighbor, cut green at his Michigan cabin, it continued to crack progressively through the turning process and reminded me of the huge uncontrollable energy of an exploding volcano! The bark inclusion is painted reactive patina copper, brass and bronze and the lid finial is a stone mineral, found at the Science Museum, and typical of Michigan's copper mining industry where my neighbor has his cabin. The branch spindle is airbrushed with similar mineral type colors. I plan to surprise my neighbor with the burl vessel when he makes his first return cabin trip in the spring.



I'll give you some of Richard's comments I enjoyed during his talk

People get tired of turning "round & brown"

Richard showing his "snap fit" lid. It's tight putting it on but once it's on you can spin it. Never turn dry wood if you can avoid it



One his early and favorite bowls

Turn green and put a tripod foot on the bottom. Leave 3 bumps on the bottom and it will sit and be stable forever.

Put a groove around the piece near the top to emphasize the warping

> I wish people would use the things they turn or make



Richard Raffan

I took up turning to get out of London in 1970 for a change in life. Fortunately, I took to it quickly and there was not much or any competition back then.

The skew is difficult to beat as a production tool

I finished most of my work with with 180 – 240 grit; I'm not against starting with 60 grit. Woodturning has really been almost taken over by the abrasives industry.



I believe Australia's Vicmarc lathes are the world's best

I downsized to a lathe that will not take more than 12" diameter; now I don't have to keep wood for the bigger lathe.

I turn mostly "street trees." The European trees that were planted along the streets are now dying.

We're not here to push tools into wood; we're here to hold a tool so the wood will come to the tool to be cut.

My favorite wood to turn is the Bradford (Manchurian) pear

I've travelled (at least by air so I have the records) over 1,000,000 miles to demonstrate wood turning



My early inspirations were from potters

You can do anything with a ½" spindle gouge

You don't need surgically sharp tools

Paint a piece black to analyze its shape

I like very thin bowls.

I'm a notoriously bad grinder

I couldn't stand the class system in the UK. I was a child in Australia, then we moved to England, then I moved back to Australia.
