History: A friend, who is a Ramsey County Deputy Sheriff, took down a 60+ year-old walnut tree last September and was kind enough to provide me with about 2000 lbs of walnut crotches. In return, I turned four bowls from a branch for each of his four boys.


A dear friend brought me a piece of koa wood from her visit to Hawaii. My bride wanted a vase, so here it is.

This is the catalpa door prize (a small bowl blank won by virtue of the tape found under my chair) at the 2020 Christmas party. I really liked the form that Dan Larson created on his recognition award bowl that he presented to Mike Rohrer at the party, so I followed with a similar style silhouette. I airbrushed cold water fabric dye to the outside and applied white liming wax. I used 25% cut back tung oil on the inside and decided against black liming wax there since the natural color open grain already presented a nice enough contrast

I thought the catalpa open grain really grabbed hold of the wax very nicely on the bowl's outside! It took a long time for the very green blank to give up its high moisture content. I recorded the descending weight of the roughed out blank and it surprisingly lost nearly a half-pound of moisture over a 6-month period.

This is my first entry for the challenge. The turning hobby is new to me; the club is new to me. I engraved the top at home in my heated shop, the garage.

The partial twist vessel is birch with walnut lid. This was fairly easy to make compared to the ones with 2 or 3 twists. The little one is Russian olive with a holly finial. Holly is so nice to work with when you are turning something delicate.

The vessel is a 4-axis turned lidded vessel of catalpa wood with a Brazilian cherry finial, 7" high x 3" max diameter (with four curved facets for each of the axes). Finished with 2 coats of the Osmo Polyx clear satin finish, which filled the end grain pores remarkably well for only two applications.



Cherry, walnut, maple, padauk & Brazilian cherry; 5 ½" high x 5 ½" wide, finished with boiled linseed oil

A natural edge black cherry burl box with African ebony finial on the lid, 6" high x 6" wide. Finished with boiled linseed oil.



This is the 1 ¼" branch with the burl. It turns out that the burl had a copper wire in it and was multiple unit housing for an ant nest and some type of beetles.

Bottom ring is walnut, middle ring oiticica, top ring walnut, top is white oak, and knob is jatoba. It is about 6 1/2" in diameter and 5" tall, finished with Doctor's High Build Friction Polish and homemade polish with diatomaceous earth and beeswax. My first 2 turned lidded boxes, maple and apple

My attempt at a Raffan style box; gray elm, finished with Mahoney's oil and wax

This is my second successful box; I've only been turning since November. The bottom is walnut from the bargain bin at Rockler and the top is maple and recycled from a failed box attempt. Sanded up to 600 grit, then hit with EEE and finished with Shellawax.







Cherry 6" diameter burl on a 17" branch, turned as one integral piece, except for the supporting base, which is black ash burl. The cherry burl is hollowed to accept either a glass candle holder, a house plant, or maybe nuts and candy. The burl was given to me by a neighbor, cut green at his Michigan cabin, it continued to crack progressively through the turning process and reminded me of the huge uncontrollable energy of an exploding volcano! The bark inclusion is painted reactive patina copper, brass and bronze and the lid finial is a stone mineral, found at the Science Museum, and typical of Michigan's copper mining industry where my neighbor has his cabin. The branch spindle is airbrushed with similar mineral type colors. I plan to surprise my neighbor with the burl vessel when he makes his first return cabin trip in the spring.

These maple boxes are about 2 1/2" in diameter by 3+" tall and finished with walnut oil. The one on the right has a piece of butternut inset into the top. They are turned from the scrap ends of baseball bat billets that the Hillerich and Bradsby Company used to make Louisville Sluggers.

I just finished the 3rd urn for dog ashes for a friend. He will have a photo of the dogs laser engraved on the face of each urn. So, I kept the designs simple and they won't have a finish applied until after they have been engraved.

This 3rd urn is made of hickory segments with a pewter ornament on the lid. The other two, which I made in January, were from flowering crab apple (a solid piece with black cherry top) and birch (rings, not segments, also with a pewter ornament on the lid).

Having watched the AAW demos on waterfall bowls several times, I gave it a try. Looking through my stash of wood the only burl I could find suitable was a small red mallee. I remembered about mallee being hard, but I gave it a try anyway. Although it had several voids which presented several additional opportunities, I was pleased with the final product. The waterfall is only about 4" in diameter and I used some of my precious Nigerian ebony for the base and finial.
