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

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Diane and Bob Puetz Stepping Down as Directors of Beads of Courage



MWA ZOOM INTERVIEW

MWA: We are saddened that you will no longer be managing the MWA's Beads of Courage program.

Diane & Bob: We will no longer be managing the BOC/MWA bead box distribution. We will continue with the BOC Beads in the Mail program only. This is the special MWA program in which we mail out bead boxes to kids who do not receive their treatment at a hospital with a sponsored BOC program. The kids get their beads and bead boxes through the mail. Jay Schulz will be taking over the management and distribution of bead boxes with the club.







MWA: How and when did you first become involved with Beads of Courage?

Diane & Bob: Our daughter, Christy, worked with Beads of Courage in Phoenix and did some of the staff trainings at hospitals across the U.S. when they were starting the BOC program. She would occasionally request that Bob make a box for one of the kids she met at a hospital. Bob started making them around 2005.







In 2013, Bob talked to Neil Robinette about getting the club involved . . . and away it went! The first bowls were turned in at the November 2013 meeting and it has never slowed down. Our bead boxes mainly stay in Minnesota.







MWA: Can you give us a little history of Beads of Courage? When and where did it start? When did it go national and how widespread is Beads of Courage?

Diane & Bob: The Beads of Courage Program was started by Pediatric Oncology nurse, Jean Gribbon, who happens to be from Minnesota. She wanted to give her patients something for the treatments and procedures that they went through that was more tangible than a paper sticker. She felt beads would be a perfect way for a child to show their beads and tell their story. The first pilot program was started in 2003 at Phoenix Children's Hospital with the Oncology Program only.

Diane & Bob: They now have 170+ member hospitals in the U.S. and programs in England, Wales, Scotland, Ireland, Canada, Japan, New Zealand, and Australia and serve 60,000+ kids with programs in Hematology/ Oncology, Cardiac, Chronic Conditions, NICU, Burn & Fusion.

MWA: How many Beads of Courage boxes and games has the MWA contributed?

Diane & Bob: To date, the MWA has made 918 bead boxes, 285 ball & cup games, 51 tops, and 276 cloth bead bags.

Diane & Bob: We keep in touch with our hospital contacts and deliver the boxes to them when needed. The hospital staff then gives them out. The same with the BOC Beads in the Mail requests, only they are mailed by us.



MWA: How are boxes that are not mailed distributed? Do you have one place to deliver them or several?

Diane & Bob: We usually work with the Child Life Specialists at these Minnesota Hospitals: Mayo, North Memorial NICU Robinsdale, Children's Hospital & Clinics of MN, and U of MN Masonic Children's Hospital. We contact them regarding their box needs or they contact us directly.

MWA: What will you miss the most about not being in charge of Beads of Courage?

Diane & Bob: We'll miss talking with and meeting the woodturners who make the boxes. From now on, Jay will collect and distribute the boxes with Diane doing the mailing of bead boxes to kids in the BOC Beads in the Mail Program.



Core for 2nd bowl

I have had two of these 20.5 lb. lignum vitae blanks for 10+ years and didn't know what to do with them. The wood comes from Florida, the West Indies and Central America. Lignum vitae is one of the heaviest lumbers known to commerce. No wood has been found to be its equal for ship's propeller shafts, bushings and bearings. Because of its self-lubricating properties, it normally lasts three times as long as steel or bronze. Small bearings are widely used for clocks, fans and air conditioning units.






Walnut & bamboo platter from a board from Charlie Prokop's class March 16, 10 ¾" x ¾"




Rhapsody on Blue





Kirk spent most effort explaining the use of the One Way system of grinding, which he considers the standard of the industry







Using the spindle roughing gouge as an example, Kirk emphasized the steady control that is key to accurate sharpening



<u>Deep Hollowing Tool Rests from</u> <u>Steve Kingdon at Houck Tools</u>

Many of you may have seen Dan Larson demo the deep hollowing tool rest for his Grandma's Fairy Box on Feb. 16th. They are sturdy and are very useful for a variety of deep vessel cutting and scraping jobs. The tool rest portion is 5" long, 2" wide and ½" thick and positioned on a 6" long 1" diameter post (top & side view photos on next page). Steve Kingdon made and sold a batch of these to MWA in 2018. Eight of our MWA turners have expressed interest in purchasing these and so I asked Steve if he was interested in making another production run. He is interested but now I need to get a better idea of just how many folks are interested. They were \$35 back in 2018 but Steve knows that material and labor costs are up, and they will be more expensive, but we won't know how much more until we get a better idea of total number of tool rests wanted by our group.

Deep hollowing Tool Rests part 2

I have also approached Steve about fabricating a modified version of his traditional tool rest as a complement to the earlier version. I found limitations when using the tool rest on very deep and narrow projects such as beer steins and deep steep boxes and because of a feature of the Laguna banjo. The Laguna banjo has difficulty in locking down when the post is directly over the center of the ways. The Laguna banjo also has wide shoulders which consume 1' to 1-½" of the 3" reach of the traditional tool rest. (I heard that locking the banjo issue may also exist with Powermatics as well.) See original rest below. So, I began to think that a slight offset would be useful and as I had some issues with tools hanging way over the tool rest in very deep narrow vessels (e.g. beer steins) I thought that I would add a little additional reach. I suggested the alternate version shown in the right portion of the right photo. It adds a 1-½" offset and increases the reach from 3" to 5-½". The modified version shown is a wood mock-up. I've used it and it works with a little bit of vibration. A metal one would be the cat's meow.




Check out the 2 on-line programs regarding George Wurtzel. The artist's creating George's portrait so he could see himself is especially touching.
