## d. Main Presentation

Due to a number of factors, including technical difficulties and vacations, photos from the entire September meeting are not available. ## **Turning a Long, Thin Stemmed Goblet With Captive Rings**

### **Preparing the Wood**



Select a piece of straight, narrow grained wood, clear of any knots or inclusions. Any green wood will work, but a piece that has good grain definition or contrast is helpful. Cut the wood to a 3" x 3" blank, about 7" to 9" long. Try to cut along its grain or growth ring.


Locate a pronounced grain and trace it along the length of the blank and across the end grain on both ends.





Count the growth rings from the line you just drew to find the approximate center. Mark the same ring on both sides by counting the same number of rings in the same direction on both sides. With an awl or center punch, mark the growth ring you identified.

Mount the blank on the lathe with the center pin of the drive spur and live center on the growth ring you marked in the previous step. Be aware that the piece will likely be off center and wobble when you start your lathe, but this step is critical. The goal is to have a single growth ring or two run straight through the stem to provide maximum strength, stability, and straightness when drying.







Create a tenon appropriate to the 4-jaw chuck and jaw profile you'll be using.

The tenon should be close to, but not touching the bottom of the jaws. For maximum gripping straight, create a shoulder that will mate with the outer face of the jaws. Use your tail stock/live center to apply lateral pressure as you tighten up the jaw of your chuck.



### **Shaping and Hollowing the Cup**



I use a rule of thumb (or should I say "finger") to determine the depth of the cup. Consider a depth that allows comfortably extending your index finger inside the cup for sanding and finishing.

With the live center still in place, begin shaping the top 2/3 of the cup to finish size and sand if desired. Keep a significant amount of wood on the bottom 1/3 (approx. 1 1/2" diameter) to provide the mass necessary to insure strength and stability while hollowing the cup.







Apply additional strips of masking tape from the top of the cone to the center of your goblet cup. Stretch the tape slightly and secure these strips in place with additional tape applied around the cone and goblet. The purpose of this step is to apply a "pull" versus pushing force on the wood. This will be critical as you begin to turn the stem. This pulling force reduces the tendency to cause "flinging" and/or distortion while turning the stem.

## **Shaping the Stem and Captive Rings**

Turn the stem of the goblet to the desired size of the rings you wish to create. For me, a common size is 1".

Note the straight grain running through the stem.





Locate the first ring about an inch away from the cup. This will be critical in the next few steps.

Sand the ring to the desired finish before you part the ring from the stem.

The tool I use to part the rings is a mechanic's pick, available at NAPA or other automotive parts stores. There's no special sharpening. With a scraping action, remove the material under the ring incrementally as you alternate from side to side.

Too long and you may burn the wood.








The next steps will prepare a convenient way to finish the underside of your ring. Apply double stick tape to a piece of sandpaper. I use 180 grit.

Trim the sandpaper and attach it to the 1" area you created between the first ring and the goblet cup. This creates a temporary sanding drum. A gap between the ends of the sandpaper is better than an overlap.





Turn the lathe on at a slow speed. With your fingertips, roll the ring on the revolving sandpaper to shape and finish the inside. The same technique can be used if you want a round ring versus a wedding band style ring.


When Linda arrived, she explained the demonstration. It entailed cutting details into various objects as shown below:


