








Diagram of dimensions for beginning the turning of the cylinder




Tips for Turners









Evaluating Cracks, Knots, and Voids

By Mark F. Palma

Character and design opportunity are just two of the terms used to describe flaws in our turning blanks. Wood is an imperfect material. It expands and contracts in response to humidity changes, grows irregularly, and can dry unevenly. All these traits bring natural beauty to wood, but also set up stresses that may cause the wood to crack, check, or split. Knots are generally visible on the blank. Voids, pitch pockets, and other flaws are not always visible on the exterior of a blank but reveal themselves

TECHNIQUE

Aesthetic cracks



1. The crack in the side of this oak blank could be filled, though longterm stability is questionable because the crack extends through the rim. A better option might be a butterfly (or Dutchman) inlay. If the piece is intended for a long life of food service, consider using a different blank.
